





ACFFA Hits the Big Screen


ACFFA brought salmon farming careers to the big screen this year! From Feb 14–27, our high-energy career video played during the Captain America: Brave New World pre-show in Cineplex theatres in Dieppe, Moncton, Fredericton, Saint John, and Miramichi. Photos and videos of industry professionals were also featured in theatre concession areas, putting our people front and center for moviegoers.





ACFFA created six new Instagram reels this year spotlighting careers in finfish farming, featuring these roles: Artist, Marine Environmental Biologist, Engineer, Boat Captain/Net Cleaner, Data Analyst and Remote Feeder.

The campaign kicked off in October to coincide with career month in schools, building on the success of last year's popular career reels.































Community and Educational Outreach

We continue to see strong interest in our community outreach and educational activities. Between career fairs and presentations, The Farm on the Sea readings, STEM and STEAM event participation, professional development days for teachers, NB science fair adjudication and ocean science camps, ACFFA's Community Outreach and Education Coordinator Katelyn Harris and Science Liaison Coordinator Evie Gagné have chatted with almost 10,000 people about fish farming. Since its launch in 2023, our outreach program has grown significantly and has become key to raising awareness and understanding of sustainable aquaculture across the region.

New Sea Lice Reporting System

After almost 15 years of use the DSS (Decision Support System) run by the Atlantic Veterinary College for sea lice reporting was retired. The new version (collecting the same data) is maintained by ACFFA (in New Brunswick) and NAIA (in Newfoundland) and acts as a third-party reporting system between industry and provincial governments. Industry members have been pleased with the new system, as it is more user friendly and cost-effective.

Atlantic Canada Aquaculture Mission to Norway 2025

From August 14–22, ACFFA led a 53-person delegation on the Atlantic Canada Aquaculture Mission to Norway, touring facilities in Ålesund and attending AquaNor in Trondheim. The mission highlighted innovative Norwegian aquaculture technologies and practices, offering Canadian industry members insights for application at home. It also created B2B opportunities for Canadian companies to showcase their expertise and products. ACFFA designed and managed the Atlantic Canada booth, sponsored by ACOA and the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Labrador and Prince Edward Island. Our "Peace, Love and Farmed Atlantic Salmon" shirts and stickers were once again a hit with Aqua Nor delegates.

















INNOVATION AND SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

Annual Research, Science and Technology Forum

Approximately 115 salmon farmers, industry stakeholders, scientists, researchers, provincial and federal government representatives, and community members came together both in-person and virtually for the ACFFA's 2024 Science, Research and Technology Forum in St. Andrews, NB. Bob Sweeney was the recipient of the 2024 Atlantic Canada Aquaculture Award in recognition of his long-time contributions to the advancement and sustainability of this region's salmon farming sector. Bob founded Sweeney International Marine Corp (SIMCorp), which has grown into a pillar of environmental stewardship in the aquaculture industry. Sweeney was unable to attend the awards dinner, but SimCorp's Chief Administrative Officer Amanda Dinsmore accepted the award and read a statement on his behalf, A Charity Auction held during the Gala dinner raised \$3,500 for the Atlantic Salmon Research Award.


Fundy Salmon Recovery

The Fundy Salmon Recovery program continues to forge ahead as one of the most successful wild Atlantic salmon recovery projects in Canada. The diverse partners (ACFFA, University of New Brunswick, Government of New Brunswick, Cooke Inc, Parks Canada and Fort Folly First Nation) meet monthly to work together to continue enhancing the wild Atlantic Salmon inner Bay of Fundy populations.

Despite a very dry summer and fall, more than 100 returning wild salmon from the project have been found in the partner rivers (Petitcodiac, Big Salmon and Point Wolfe) so far in 2025 and more are expected after rain is received. Partners are returning 2068 wild maturing salmon to the three inner Bay of Fundy rivers during the end of September and in October. Amlamgog (Fort Folly First Nation) held a celebration of the program and a public fish release in Elgin on October 2nd. It was a beautiful day with touching words by Chief Rebecca Knockwood and Knowledge Keeper Nicole Porter who performed a water blessing.

There are 1,010 '2024-year' class immature salmon currently on the wild salmon marine conservation farm in Dark Harbour, Grand Manan. These will be held over for release in 2026, in addition to 2,698 '2025-year' class fish, some of which will also be released in 2026.

















INNOVATION AND SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

Wild Salmon Research Project

With funding from the Atlantic Fisheries Fund, the Atlantic Canada Fish Farmers Association (ACFFA), the University of New Brunswick (UNB), and Fort Folly Habitat Recovery (FFHR) are conducting research designed to evaluate the efficacy of using wild-exposed salmon to restore Atlantic salmon populations in the Inner Bay of Fundy. Key activities include:

- Enhanced detection and monitoring systems in the Petitcodiac River and rivers in Fundy National Park to track adult salmon movement and distinguish between true wild returns and restoration program salmon.
- Genetic diversity testing and evaluation of epigenetic changes to better understand and protect salmon populations.
- Expanded in-river assessments to monitor spawning, juvenile production, and kelts, generating valuable new data to refine restoration strategies.

Atlantic Salmon Research Award

Kristin Armstrong, a master's student at the University of New Brunswick who is investigating the reproductive success of captively reared salmon for the purposes of conservation as part of the Fundy Salmon Recovery program, is the first recipient of the Atlantic Salmon Research Award.

The Atlantic Canada Fish Farmers Association Salmon Research Award was established in honour of Betty House whose passion for and dedication to salmon in Atlantic Canada was marked by her 20+ year career in the salmon aquaculture industry and her role in the Inner Bay of Fundy Salmon Recovery Project.

The \$2000 annual award is presented to a post secondary student who is making contributions to research in fish health, nutrition, innovation, genetics, and/or technologies that contribute to Atlantic salmon rearing, stocking, or conservation.





ACFFA Golf Tourney

We had a great turnout for ACFFA's 2025 Golf Tourney! Team SimCorp took top spot, followed by Team Cooke in second place and Team Optimar in third. For the second year in a row, Greg Groom won the \$250 Putting Contest sponsored by Cooke Inc. Trevor Bishop had the longest drive while Matt Scott had closest to the pin. ACFFA Joins Agricultural Alliance of New Brunswick

ACFFA became an associate member of the Agricultural Alliance of New Brunswick. Agriculture is aquaculture and we look forward to joining other food producers to share knowledge, strengthen connections, and highlight the vital role of farmers - on land and at sea - in feeding our communities.















Woodwards Cove Wharf

Infrastructure priorities remain focused on ensuring we have access to safe wharves. The Department of Fisheries and Oceans funded the development of the Woodwards Cove Wharf to be shovel ready in January 2024 which has occurred however there are no funds to continue and there are two land acquisition challenges. ACFFA continues to work collaboratively with fisher associations to address harbour infrastructure issues.

Limekiln Wharf Facility

Operating a private marine tidal wharf facility to service our members and the local community, the ACFFA Limekiln Wharf Service Centre provides year-round priority admission to our members who pay for access. This year, annual user fees were implemented to support Bay Management Areas 1, 2a and 6.



Championing Gender Equality – VIVE (Business Champion 2025)

Outgoing Executive Director Susan Farquharson received the Minister's Award for Excellence in Championing Gender Equality – VIVE (Business Champion 2025). She championed gender equity in aquaculture through initiatives like the Women of Salmon Farming Symposium, career videos highlighting women in the industry, and the Sea of Change roundtable. Her leadership fostered inclusion and opportunity, leaving a lasting impact locally and globally.
